Prior to the Gold Rush, an estimated 4 to 5 million acres of wetlands were present in <u>California</u>. Now, more than 95 percent of the historic wetlands and more than 90 percent of the riparian corridors have been destroyed or grossly modified.

In some years, 60 percent of the entire Pacific Flyway and up to 20 percent of North America's waterfowl population winters or migrates throughout California. Nowhere else in the world do so many waterfowl winter on such a small wetland base. Ducks Unlimited has recognized the combined Central Valley and <u>San Francisco Bay area</u> as one of five highest habitat priorities in North America. California also has other regions that are important to waterfowl. Northeast California's <u>Great Basin</u> habitats stage massive flocks of <u>snow geese</u> and <u>pintails</u> during their spring migration. The <u>Sonoran Desert's Salton Sea and lower</u> <u>Colorado River region winters large numbers of waterfowl and play an important role in supporting Pacific Flyway ducks and geese.</u>

To date, Ducks Unlimited has implemented more than **1,300** conservation projects conserving more than **719,000** acres of wetlands and associated uplands in California alone.

The banquet hall was full of DU merchandise and unique items donated by local businesses. There were plenty of guns to excite the crowd, plus games like Ducky Dice and Blackjack, and a wall of guns from Sportsman's Warehouse. The energy level was high and the crowd was there to have fun while supporting DU, the leader in wetlands conservation

The evening started off with cocktails and appetizers while the attendees enjoying trying their luck on the Ducky Dice and Blackjack table, both games featured a fine firearm as the prize for one lucky winner. The Wall of Guns was a big hit with three winners choosing their pick of guns they won. Raffle ticket sales were better this year than ever before with sales going over \$28,000.

The live auction was a mix of items from the DU catalog and hunting trips ranging from a hunt in the San Francisco Bay and Northern California to hunts in Texas and South Carolina and Argentina. The live auction also featured a golf trip to Pebble Beach, plus several custom items from local artists and DU supporters. The attendees supported DU very well with the live auction raising over \$33,000.

"Overall it was a great night for the ducks," said Martin C. Anderson, Regional Director for DU. "The Fresno DU committee planned and executed the event with great enthusiasm. I couldn't be more proud of the Team of DU volunteers we have in Fresno, it's a pleasurer working with them." Thanks to the hard work and efforts of the Fresno DU committee the dinner raised over \$75,000 to further the mission of Ducks Unlimited.

Great things sometimes come in small packages. The Fort Bragg, <u>California</u>, DU chapter is a case in point. Despite its small size, this remote lumber and fishing community, located on California's rocky coastline about 165 miles northwest of San Francisco, has been churning out impressive DU events for the past 30 years.

Since its inception, the Fort Bragg chapter has been guided by two remarkable DU <u>volunteers</u>, District Chairman Gary Roussan and Area Chairmen Greg Petersen. Welcoming around 100 event attendees per year, these two gentlemen, along with other volunteers on their committee, have grossed an estimated \$800,000 for DU. In addition, this chapter has maintained an average fundraising efficiency ratio of nearly 78 percent over the past 10 years.



Regional Leadership Meeting, Las Vegas NV August 19-21, 2016



Traveling with your Pets Written by Pamela Taylor

As I attended a workshop recently about "Traveling with your Pets" I got to thinking about all the traveling within and out of state many of you may have or be taking with your dogs on hunting trips. As I am not a hunter myself I got to thinking about the information we were given and thought I would pass along.

The first thing you should prepare is a Medical B.O.B. (Bug out Bag) that you should have while traveling.

- Records
 - 1. Vaccination, Heartworm and parasiticide (Flea, tick, tapeworm) history.
 - 2. Pertinent medical records and attending vet contact information if your pet has an ongoing medical condition or significant medical history.
 - 3. Medications your pet is currently taking (strength and frequency).
 - 4. Microchip and other identification information.
 - 5. Health certificate and other necessary paperwork, if crossing national borders.
- Medications and Treatments make sure you have enough for the whole trip (plus some extra.)
- Restraint Equipment leash or harness, crate +/- muzzle, clothes
- First Aid Kit:
 - 1. Know your vet's contact information, and that of the emergency clinic in your destination area.
 - 2. Animal Poison Control: (888) 426-4435
 - 3. Emergency Pet Kit:
 - Thermometer normal 100 101F
 - Scissors
 - Leash
 - Kaopectate
 - Benadryl
 - Charcoal
 - Neosporin
 - Ace Bandage
 - Telfa Pad
 - Roll Gauze

- Dose Syringe
- Muzzle
- Pepto Bismol
- Stethoscope
- Dramamine
- Peroxide
- CoFlex (Bandage Material)
- Adhesive Tape
- Maxi Pad

In the event that you must take you pet to a veterinarian for illness or injury, be very candid and complete about ALL medications given or possible substance exposure they may have gotten a hold of in a hotel room you may have stayed in. This will help to determine the best treatment options and needs your pet may need. If you also keep a file on your pet while traveling (i.e. all vet records) this will also help the veterinarian expedite the care that is needed for your pet.

Here are some items that you should watch for and/or be aware of at while traveling to that duck hunting location. While I know there are many other things to think about I thought this would be a start.

- Hypothermia
 - 1. Most dogs, especially sporting and hunting breeds, are well able to tolerate cold and even freezing temperatures while physically active. Chilling occurs while sedentary, wet and/or in the wind.
 - 2. Treat by submerging in tub of warm (not hot) water and monitor core body temperature. If a tub is not available, use floorboard heater on high or a hair dryer. At the very least swath in dry bedding and protect from the wind.
 - 3. Continue treating until core temperature is at least 98F.

- Carsickness
 - 1. More prevalent in puppies and most outgrow it.
 - 2. Apparent as drooling, panting, vomiting, restlessness, anxiety.
 - 3. Manage by conditioning and practice short rides around the black, progressing to multi-stop trips in town, then actual road trips.
 - 4. Crate travel helps with stability and security keep practicing.
 - 5. Travel on an empty stomach and bowels. On travel day skip breakfast and take a long walk in the morning. Potty and water breaks should be approximately every 2 hours throughout the day. Feed later in the afternoon and remember to let your pet out several times before bed.
 - 6. For those pets who need more help: Dramamine 25 to 50mg for small to large dogs every 8 hours. Starting this at least 1 hour prior to departure.

These were just some of the things that were presented to us by one veterinarian. Please consult with YOUR veterinarian before traveling or taking that new bird puppy out for the first time because we know how precious your pet is.
