Ambitious conservation effort launched in Michigan Project will protect, enhance or restore 4,000 acres across 22 counties



ANN ARBOR, Michigan – April 27, 2017 – Ducks Unlimited and 14 conservation partners will launch a two-year habitat conservation effort across southeast Michigan to improve wildlife habitat and water quality.

The Saginaw Bay to Lake Erie Coastal Habitat Project is a \$3 million effort to improve or protect 4,081 acres on 15 habitat projects. The focus area is on the 22 coastal zone counties associated with Saginaw Bay and western Lake Erie in Michigan, and includes Lake St. Clair and the Detroit River.

"These habitats provide critical habitat for waterfowl and many other species of wetland dependent wildlife, and are vital to water quality relied upon by millions of residents," said Jason Hill, Ducks Unlimited biologist and manager of conservation programs for DU's <u>Great Lakes Initiative</u>.

Wetlands protect and improve water quality by filtering sediment and nutrients in rainwater runoff. These projects will help protect surface drinking water supplies used by more than 4 million people in the project area while enhancing fish populations and helping to reduce flood waters.

This is the fourth phase of The Saginaw Bay to Lake Erie Coastal Habitat Project, which began in 2005 and has conserved more than 10,000 acres. It targets Great Lakes coastal marshes and associated shoreline habitats, and interior wetlands and associated uplands.

More than 3 million waterfowl annually migrate through or breed in the Great Lakes region.

Unfortunately, Michigan has lost more than 50 percent of its historical wetlands and losses in some coastal counties along Saginaw Bay and western Lake Erie exceed 90 percent. Further troubling is the estimated 99 percent loss of Michigan's prairie habitat, with less than 1 percent of Michigan's historic lake plain wet prairie intact today.

The public benefits from permanent protection of Great Lakes coastal wetlands, inland wetlands, and associated uplands, maintaining a perpetual habitat base for wetland dependent wildlife and fisheries. These actions provide outdoor recreational opportunities on public lands, primarily increased hunting and fishing opportunities for Michigan's nearly 2 million hunters and anglers.

"Fortunately, a dedicated partnership has come together for more than a decade to consistently leverage funding for wetland conservation and management in this corridor," Hill said.

Funding comes from a \$1 million federal North American Wetlands Conservation Act grant and 15 supporting partners including Ducks Unlimited. Partners also include private residents, corporate partner Axalta Coating Systems, non-profit conservation organizations and government agencies such as the Michigan Department of Natural Resources.

Pulling Triggers with Michigan's Lawmakers

Michigan DU volunteers and staff enjoyed an afternoon outdoors with Michigan's elected officials at the Capitol Area Sportsmen's League just outside of Lansing last month, May 23rd. The lawmakers in attendance were all members of the Michigan legislative Sportsmen's Caucus, which is a group of Senators and Representatives from both sides of the aisle who work to protect and enhance Michigan's sportsmen's traditions.

The event brought together representatives from over a dozen hunting, angling, recreational shooting, and trapping organizations with Caucus members and staff from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. Attendees participated in a number of activities, including trap and five stand shooting, lessons on patterning turkey guns, dog training, archery shooting, and fly fishing lessons. After the activities, attendees proceeded inside the clubhouse for a wild game dinner featuring bear, venison, and duck served by Gourmet Gone Wild.

DU has been a proud supporter of the Michigan Legislative Sportsmen's Caucus for several years and through activities like this, the organization has developed strong relationships with legislators from across the state and been able to educate them on the importance of wetland conservation and our waterfowling heritage.

Legislative Update

DU is currently monitoring the progress of House Bill 4533, introduced by Rep. Curt Vanderwall of Ludington, which would allow nonresident hunters possessing a 7-day small game hunting license to purchase a waterfowl license. Currently, visitors to Michigan wishing to hunt waterfowl must buy a \$151 base non-resident hunting license before they are eligible to purchase a waterfowl license necessary to pursue ducks and geese. When combined with the waterfowl license fee, it costs visitors over \$100 more to hunt waterfowl here than the average cost to duck hunt as a non-resident in any of the other Midwestern states. This is a potential financial barrier to friends and family traveling to Michigan who wish to experience our state's high quality waterfowl hunting. The bill would also create a new 3-day non-resident small game license that would also qualify a visitor to purchase their waterfowl license should they only have the opportunity to hunt for a few days. HB 4533 currently sits in the House Tourism and Outdoor Recreation Committee where it awaits a vote.

Winter SNO Advisory

On Thursday, February 9th, the Flat River Chapter experienced a SNO Storm. I know it's a corny pun but I don't know of a better way to put it. Our Committee, under the leadership of its new Chairman, Jared Roberts, had a great night with our annual SNO event. Eight years ago, we were looking for a third event to hold in addition to our regular Banquet and Shoot events. We decided upon trying a **S**portsman's **N**ight **O**ut, and after a few years of adjusting and modifying the event we have come to our current format.

This year was our best SNO event yet; hosting 239 guests (sold out) on a Thursday night, with a Net/Net income of \$16,915 and 55% efficiency. This was accomplished without any Sponsors or Underwriting. If any of you are looking to grow your Chapter's revenue and expand your membership this is a great event to accomplish those goals. We hold this event within three months of our other two and do not steal or detract from either of them, if anything, we have garnered more participation in our other events as a result of this one.

The format is simple and easy to put together. We hold the event on a weeknight and it goes quick, did I mention the whole event took less than two and half hours. We focus on hunting and fishing items with very little art and home décor; very little. Almost all the items are ones that the guests can take out into the field tomorrow. All our prizes are what I call meaningful items, in that there are no trinkets and small items, nothing that a guest would generally just go out and buy without thinking about it, like hats and DVD's. Our merchandise items run about \$75 on average, with Ice Shanties and Augers, nice Knives, Exploding Targets... things people desire. Did I mention the guns; we gave away 24 guns that night, yeah that sold some tickets... Our big money maker is the Bucket Raffle with 18 guns and 18 merchandise items. We also had a highly profitable raffle in which we gave all three guns of the year away in one game; almost tripling our money on them.

For food, again, we keep it simple: all you can eat beer and brats. Ticket cost is \$35 per guest with no table packages or anything optional. We do it this way to keep things simple and to appeal to the person who just wants to come out and have a Night Out. Also, without asking for any underwriting, sponsorships, or going after our local corporations for support, that leaves the door open for us for their support and underwriting of our other events.

One last point; we have found that with this format our attendees have very little to virtually no overlap to our other events, we are reaching a completely new group of members. You can hold this event at the same time of the year as your other events, it doesn't need to be 6 months away, as it won't interfere.

If you want to grow and breathe some new life into your Chapter, consider a SNO event. With a little extra effort, you can really help MI DU and the Ducks.

of Maple River State Game Area

Located right off U.S. Route 127 just north of Lansing is the Maple River State Game Area, one of our State's valuable public hunting areas. Whether you enjoy hunting for waterfowl, deer, pheasants, or just enjoy wildlife photography, this property has it all thanks to the tremendous habitat conservation efforts of Ducks Unlimited (DU) and our partners. The wetland restoration completed at this site by DU and the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) is worth showcasing and so on April 1, DU hosted the second annual Maple River Migration Tour. Members of the public walked the dikes alongside elected officials and waterfowl experts from the DNR and DU, while observing numerous species of waterfowl present that day. The sun shined and the birds were there in full spring plumage. DU and the DNR have conserved nearly 800 acres at this vital migration rest stop since 2011. This wonderful event was made possible because of the support from local DU volunteers and DNR staff.
