DU Integral part of Michigan Legislative Sportsmen's Caucus

The pursuit of feathers, fins and fur in Michigan generates over \$4 billion a year in economic revenue. This revenue supports over 70,000 jobs statewide. These facts are not lost on a group of outdoor minded legislators called the Legislative Sportsmen's Caucus (MLSC). The caucus is led by four co-chairs: Sen. Pete McGregor (R-Rockford), Sen. David Knezek (D-Dearborn Heights), Rep. Triston Cole (R-Mancelona) and Rep. Phil Phelps (D-Flushing). The caucus is a bipartisan, bicameral group of legislators who support hunting, fishing, trapping and recreational shooting throughout Michigan.

This network of pro-sportsmen legislators serves as a conduit for conservation for groups like Michigan Ducks Unlimited. DU stands ready to evaluate pending legislation on the effect that legislative would and could have on wetlands and our hunting heritage. Ducks Unlimited provides information using sound science that helps guide legislators when making important decisions.

Michigan Ducks Unlimited serves on the advisory council that helps further inform legislators on issues important to the state's natural resources and outdoor recreation economy.

Please take a moment out of your busy schedules to find out who your State Representative and State Senator are, if you haven't already, and contact them. Let them know that you are involved with Ducks Unlimited and make yourself known to them. DU will need your help down the road when critical issues in the conservation world come up, and by your contacts with your legislators we can make a difference.

Steve Wyckoff serves as the Public Policy Chairman for Michigan Ducks Unlimited and Kyle Rorah is the treasurer of the Advisory Council.

"Michigan's hunters and anglers support all species of wildlife through the purchase of their annual hunting and fishing licenses, the revenue from which goes directly towards habitat improvement, wildlife research, and improved recreational access on public lands," said Caucus Co-Chair Senator David Knezek (D-Dearborn Heights). "These outdoor activities and the professional management of Michigan's natural resources are not partisan issues and it must remain that way."

"It's great to be able to work with an organization like DU that is focused like a laser on Conservation. Hunters do so much for Wildlife and so does DU," said caucus Co-Chair Rep. Triston Cole (R-Mancelona). "Also DU's support and work with the Michigan Sportsman's Caucus is awesome! The educational opportunities and building relationships with Legislators is invaluable."

Co-chair Rep. Phil Phelps (D-Flushing) describes, "The Sportsmen's Caucus keeps the experienced members grounded in their outdoor heritage by putting them in close contact with conservation groups from around the state. While less experienced members could try something new, often not too far from their homes. Most importantly, the caucus provides conservation groups and their member's direct access to the legislative process.

"Michigan's natural resources have offered endless recreational opportunities for our citizens," said Sen. Peter MacGregor, R-Rockford. "With hunting and fishing rights continually under attack, it is important to maintain a highly engaged and informed Legislative Sportsmen's Caucus to protect our state's rich outdoor heritage for generations into the future. Michigan's large, diverse and active Legislative Sportsmen's Caucus keeps members informed not only on issues related to hunting and fishing, but also on the importance of resource conservation."

Szechuan Snow Goose Recipe by Dave Steinbach

Szechuan Snow Goose

2 SNOW GEESE, skinned and boned, 1/4 inch thick strips 2 eggs 4 tablespoons corn starch 2 teaspoons salt 4 cloves garlic , chopped 1 large onion, chopped 1/4 cup chicken stock 3 tablespoons soy sauce 2 tablespoons fresh ginger root, minced 2 tablespoons ketchup 2 tablespoons hoisin sauce 2 tablespoons sherry or rice wine 1 tablespoon hot peppers, diced 1 tablespoon sugar 1 tablespoon red wine vinegar 1 teaspoon chili peppers, dried and crushed

Blend egg, salt and cornstarch into thin batter. Coat meat with mixture. Cook in deep fryer. Remove, drain and set aside.

Heat oil in a large skillet, add garlic, onion, ginger, hot and chili peppers and saute over high heat for 2-3 minutes or until onion just starts to brown.

Add chicken stock, soy sauce, ketchup, hoisin sauce, sherry or rice wine, red wine vinegar and sugar and stir over medium-high heat until sauce thickens.

Add the cooked goose and cook over low heat for an additional 5 minutes.

Great Lakes Restoration Days Michigan State Capitol By Gildo Tori, DU Director of Public Policy

[Greeting Call.]

That is the sound of the hen mallard when she wants everyone to gather around and join together. My name is Gildo Tori, and on behalf of Ducks Unlimited I want to thank you for attending todays Great Lakes Rally.

The Great Lakes are critical for Michigan's hunter, anglers and recreationalists. No one knows that better than you. But today we wanted to use this day to ensure our elected officials know and understand that, and who better to tell them the story than you.

The Great Lakes are a vital part of all of our lives, whether Democrat or

Republican. And the efforts of the last 13 years reflect that the bipartisan nature of the Great Lakes. President George Bush started things off by declaring the Great Lakes a National Treasure in 2004, and charged us with developing a regional Great Lakes Restoration Plan. Once that restoration plan was completed, newly elected President Obama and the Congress appropriated funding for the Great Lakes Restoration Initiative.

Since those early days, the GLRI has received strong bipartisan support in our US Congress, which has resulted in more than a billion dollars being dedicated towards cleaning up toxics, fighting invasive species, improving nearshore areas, informing and monitoring, and most important to us here, conserving fish and wildlife habitat, increasing and improving public access.

In fact the GLRI has funded approximately 400 projects in Michigan alone, protecting, restoring and improving tens of thousands of acres of habitat throughout our state. There have been coastal wetlands protected, hundreds of miles of streams reconnected, lands conserved and restored back to wildlife habitat, invasive plants managed and removed, and public hunting and fishing access sites added and improved. Show the map!

DU working with our many partners, has received funding for 64 projects that have conserved more than 18,000 acres of wetlands – the majority open to hunting, fishing and trapping.

We need to tell the great story of the GLRI – and we need to tell that to our MI lawmakers so they can continue to support the DNR, other state agencies, and NGOs who are working to improve our Great Lakes, provide more fish and wildlife habitat, and most importantly, support hunters, anglers and outdoor recreationalists who support a vibrant MI tourism and recreation economy.

In fact, Hunters and Anglers, all 1.9 million of us Michiganders, spend nearly \$5 billion on our recreational pursuits; that is more than the combined receipts of corn, soybeans and dairy products in MI! As hunters and anglers, we have clout, we impact the economy and we love our Great Lakes!

Like Momma Duck says, we are stronger when we come together to work and communicate the importance of Michigan's Great Lakes and the fish, wildlife and people they support.

As you meet with your legislator, be sure to ask them to support the Great Lakes and all the groups that work to make them healthier and more productive for wildlife and people.

The beautiful engraving was done by Mr. Tim Gall and includes Victorian/Acanthus scroll, DU logos, Bulino cattails with 24 carot gold and .999 pure platinum inlays.

Tickets are 1 for \$50 or 3 for \$100 and those remaining are on a first come first served basis. There were only 200 tickets available for this custom shotgun so they are very limited.
