Jim Toth: 2019 - 2020 State Chairman



There is more great news about Michigan Ducks Unlimited, 2018 success story. I have just recently returned back from the Ducks Unlimited National Convention, held in Hawaii, May 28th.-June 2nd. Michigan Ducks Unlimited earned 8th. Place Overall out of 50 states, scoring in the top ten of 15 performance measures out of 33. Top 2019 Michigan chapters honored



Ducks Unlimited recently announced the top volunteer chapters across the nation honored in three categories: Chairman's Roll of Honor, President's Elite and President's Roll of Honor.

The Chairman's Roll of Honor designation is reserved for the chapters that raised between \$250,000 and \$999,999, while those that raised between \$100,000 and \$249,999 were named as President's Elite chapters. Rounding out the three categories, President's Roll of Honor chapters raised between \$65,000 and \$99,999.

"These fundraising events are the backbone of DU's habitat conservation efforts, and the volunteers who make up these chapters are the force making a difference for North American waterfowl populations," said DU President Rogers Hoyt Jr. "It takes a great deal of effort to achieve these prestigious levels, and these chapters deserve to be congratulated by every person who enjoys the outdoors."

This year's President's Elite chapters from Michigan include:

- Monroe Chapter, Monroe
- Greater Grand Rapids Chapter, Grand Rapids
- North Oakland Chapter, Clarkston
- Greater Kalamazoo County Chapter, Kalamazoo

This year's President's Roll of Honor chapter from Michigan is:

• Eastern U.P. Chapter, Sault Saint Marie

The chapters honored this year earned their spots on the nationally recognized lists out of more than 2,400 DU chapters nationwide that hosted more than 3,900 fundraising events. DU's event fundraising system has become a model for other conservation organizations worldwide and has helped conserve more than 14 million acres of waterfowl habitat since 1937.

"The hard work and dedication from DU's event system volunteers and staff drive the organization's conservation mission from a financial, membership and policy strength perspective. DU chapters across the country are showing that the future of waterfowl populations and the wetlands that filter our water and protect us from flooding are important to them and to their communities," Hoyt said. "The more money we raise, the more habitat we can conserve and the closer we are to preserving our waterfowl hunting heritage."



Grilled Elk Steak with Guinness Marinade by Dave Steinbach

(also works on Caribou or Whitetail)

Ingredients:

4 Elk steaks

1 teaspoon Dijon mustard

4 ounces Guinness Stout Beer room temperature

1 ounce Tamari soy sauce

1/8 teaspoon black pepper coarse grind

1/8 teaspoon salt

Bacon

1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce

2 garlic cloves

1 teaspoon shallots

1 tablespoon Vidalia onion

1/4 teaspoon Tarragon fresh

1/4 teaspoon parsley


Directions:

- * Finely chop garlic, shallot and onion and place in a small bowl.
- * Finely chop parsley and tarragon and add to the bowl.
- * Add the Worcestershire sauce, Dijon mustard, Guinness beer, Tamari and seasonings then mix well to combine.
- * Let stand for 30 minutes to blend flavors.
- * Wrap Steaks in Bacon, place steaks in the marinade and make sure it is well coated.
- * Cover the bowl and place in the refrigerator for 30 minutes or overnight if being used for a picnic entree the following day.
- * Pre heat the grill and then cook the Steaks.
- * Place the remaining marinade in a small saucepan on the grill and reduce it for one or two minutes until slightly thickened.
- * Add more beer to the marinade at this stage if desired.

I'll never forget going out on the ice in the wetlands of Sleepy Hollow State Game Area to repair wood duck boxes. In spite of the freezing temperatures, we had a great time that Saturday morning, being outside and doing what we have a passion for.

I had heard of Ducks Unlimited and wanted to get involved, but didn't know how, until I stumbled across a member in one of my classes. He was eager to give me the information I needed and told me about the project.

The boxes we placed in Sleepy Hollow were created by a local boy scout troop. The youth wanted to help, so they partnered with DU and my chapter to form the project. We work with many local organizations because our supporters are all around and eager to take action.

Just like the duck box repairing project, all the fundraisers and projects I've been part of have been worth the time spent to make them happen. As a Fisheries and Wildlife student, all I want is to make a difference and create a better habitat for the outdoors I care so much about. I found a way to do that through DU because they are involved in projects that are focused on the prosperity of wildlife. A common misconception is that the members are mostly hunters who only have their own interests in mind. While hunters are huge supporters, they aren't the only ones involved, many are birders, naturalists, and those regularly involved in conservation efforts.

MONTCALM TOWNSHIP — Forty years ago, the Ducks Unlimited (DU) Flat River Chapter started in Montcalm County with the goal of raising support and funds for the preservation of North America's wetlands.

While the chapter has seen a number of different peaks and valleys throughout the past four decades, Steve Wyckoff of Greenville is proud to say that he's been there every step of the way.

On Saturday, Wyckoff received recognition from Area Chairman Jared Roberts and the rest of the DU Flat River Chapter for his outstanding commitment to the organization during a fundraising event at the Montcalm County 4 -H Fairgrounds.

"This event itself marks the Flat River Chapter's 40-year anniversary, and Steve has been there since the very beginning," Roberts said. "He's literally seen it all. His dedication to his homeland is unrivaled and inspiring."

Wyckoff first got involved with DU three years before the Flat River Chapter began.

"I remember seeing an ad for the DU in a magazine back in 1976," Wyckoff recalled. "I thought it sounded like a pretty good idea and liked the things they were advocating for, so I became a member. A couple of years later, a group of sportsmen and sportswomen in this area were asked to start a fundraising chapter of our own. It was me, Pete Frye, Gene Baxter and just a few others back then, but we managed to get it going."

In 1979, the DU Flat River Chapter held its first fundraising banquet, which was successful enough to allow them to continue.

Since then, Wyckoff says the chapter grew and grew, all while he took on a number of different leadership positions within the organization in the years that followed — including area chairman, district chairman, executive coordinator, state chairman, chief executive officer for volunteers and regional vice president.

Ten years ago, Wyckoff stepped into a new position when he was asked to take on the duties of state public policy chairman, which is the title that he still carries today.

"Basically, this job means that I'm working with state legislators and national legislators to work on things that are politically important to DU," Wyckoff said. "Things like the farm bill, the North American Wetlands Conservation Act, etc. All of this has taken me to Washington (D.C.) three times now to discuss these things with people.

"I have no trouble finding things to do with my time, I guess. It's certainly a passion of mine and something I've done willingly, as we're not compensated in any way. It's all on our nickel when we travel like that, meaning this has really become a labor of love of mine."

All of that hard work pays off, Wyckoff says, when he walks outside and sees all of the good the DU has managed to achieve.

"The most satisfying part about all of this is when I go waterfowl hunting in the fall and just watch all of these ducks and geese. It's the frosting on the cake, the fruits of our labor," Wyckoff said. "We're not just doing this because we want to raise ducks and then shoot them. Sure, that's part of it, but it's larger. Wetlands are important in the entire makeup of life across North America, and we want to be involved in all of it."

Roberts, who additionally celebrated his final outing as area chairman on Saturday, said he was honored to know and work alongside Wyckoff during his time at the Flat River Chapter.

"It's been an honor to serve this organization with you," he said. "I look forward to many more years of friendship. This chapter really cannot thank you enough."

Craig Curtis, DU regional director of Southern Michigan, was also in attendance Saturday and echoed many of Roberts' praises of Wyckoff's devotion.

Curtis also brought Baxter, Larry Parker and Bruce Cole, all of whom have been involved with DU for more than 30 years now, up on stage with Wyckoff to thank them and present them with specialized pins.

"These gentlemen have helped generate over \$800,000 from the events held here in this county," Curtis said. "If it takes \$250 to conserve one acre of wetlands habitat, that's over 3,200 acres that you and the committee have been responsible for. This is a great, great team."

On of the highlights of the evening was the announcement of the Big Lake Marsh Dedication that will take place on Saturday, September 28th at the Kiwanis Youth Conservation Area in Bellevue, Michigan. A monument will be dedicated in honor of Larry's work with greenwings and kids across the state.

The Arbogast Family recently endowed the Larry Arbogast Family Varsity scholarship which is to be awarded to a recipient coming out of high school that plans to pursue a degree in Applied Sciences or Conservation Sciences.

The recipient of the scholarship this graduating was awarded to to Hope Showalter based on her dedication to wetland conservation while also excelling in academics. Hope has shown an exceptional level of commitment to wetland conservation through participation in her school club or DU chapter. The student has been notified, and a \$500 check will be sent to her university prior to registration. Hope will be recognized in the September/October issue of the Ducks Unlimited magazine. Hope is a graduate from Onekama Consolidated Schools in Onekama, Michigan, and she plans to attend the University of Michigan in the fall of 2019. During her time at Onekama Consolidated Schools, Hope was an exceptional student in the classroom, a member of the softball and volleyball teams and will graduate with a 4.0 cumulative GPA. Hope is also a recipient of the Manistee County Community Foundation Excellence in Education Award and serves as the Vice President of the National Honor Society.

Hope became involved with Ducks Unlimited by attending events with her father who served as treasurer for the Manistee Area Chapter. Since her high school did not have a chapter, she dedicated her time to the Manistee committee volunteering to make a difference in wetlands conservation.

Thanks to her dad, the passion she has for hunting and fishing falls hand in hand with her growing passion for conservation. Hope believes that through proactive efforts we can all make a difference in the environment for years to come.

Larry was as a machinist with the Eaton Corporation in Marshall for 30 years before retiring in 1997. Throughout his life, Larry volunteered with Toys for Tots and Big Brothers & Big Sisters.

1st Annual Duck Calling Championships

Superior Central High School Students The Punt Boat Package Concludes

On June 5 the Superior Central Public Schools, Natural Resources and Watercraft Design class, finished their semester exam with 20 minutes to spare, leaving us just enough time to finish the camouflage pattern on the punt boat. After months of work, finishing this project at the last second was a fitting end because it seemed to be a reoccurring theme for entire school year. Working together, eleven students built eleven solo canoes (pirogues), a punt boat, plus five other conservation projects. But, however stressful it was at times, it was also very successful as each of our goals were eventually met.

- *Luke worked on improving grouse habitat by planting hawthorn trees in our school forest.
- *Wyatt added solar panels to our wind turbine system to increase renewable energy capture.
- *Jordan and Alayna built and placed bat boxes to supply shelter for these beneficial mammals besieged by White Nose Syndrome.
- *Jeremy and Avery built and placed fish cribs in the Quarry Pond to provide habitat for its fish population.
- *Sophie and Charlotte maintained and monitored the water quality and fish health in our expanded aquaponics system.

*Aurora, Bailey and Abbi drew up plans, built a scale model, then with a little help from everybody, built a 14 ft. duck hunting punt boat. Charlotte, Sophie, Alayna and Jordan constructed a removable lath floor for it, Jeremy and Avery pitched in to build a 8 ft. push paddle, and finally Luke and Wyatt created 2 seats/storage containers to add to the overall package. We are all looking forward to July when the class will travel to the Ducks Unlimited State Convention in Lansing and see it raffled off to raise money for U.P. wetland conservation.

As always, the culminating activity of the year is our Spring Boat/Camping Trip on the Au train Basin. Eleven students launched their pirogues for the first time on the morning of May 17 into a very strong headwind. It was with a good deal of effort that we paddled to our first stop to meet Teri Grout of the Alger County Conservation District to learn about invasive species in our area. With the wind at our backs, it was a fast trip back to the campground for a quick lunch and a presentation by Alan Iho about his handmade boat. Alan traveled with us in his electrically powered craft on our morning excursion, so we all got a good look at his boat on the water, but now that it was back on its trailer we were able to see it in detail as Alan spoke to the class about his boat's design, construction technique and future boat-building plans. Tim Schirtzinger was up next and demonstrated the specialized camping gear used in extended kayaking trips as well as giving some pointers on how to get started in the sport when money is a little tight. Finally, I wrapped up the day's lessons by spending a bit of time talking about keystone species in various habitats and also how people can make small contributions in a variety of creative methods to make positive impacts on the environment.

The rest of our camping trip was spect around campfires, taking quick trips in our pirogues, fishing, or just trying to stay warm and dry. You can see all of our work and travels on https://cougarwatercraft.weebly.com/


