Ducks Unlimited applies a science-based, watershed approach to deliver turnkey mitigation projects that span all types of wetlands, streams, riparian buffer and upland habitats. Under the Clean Water Act, development and construction projects that impact a wetland are required to mitigate the damage by creating a wetland of equal or greater functioning capacity.

Two options exist to provide mitigation for impacts to wetlands:

- Developers can purchase mitigation credits from a wetland mitigation bank or in-lieu fee program, or
- Developers can mitigate for their own impacts.

Ducks Unlimited's mitigation program can help developers meet their compensatory mitigation requirements in New York.

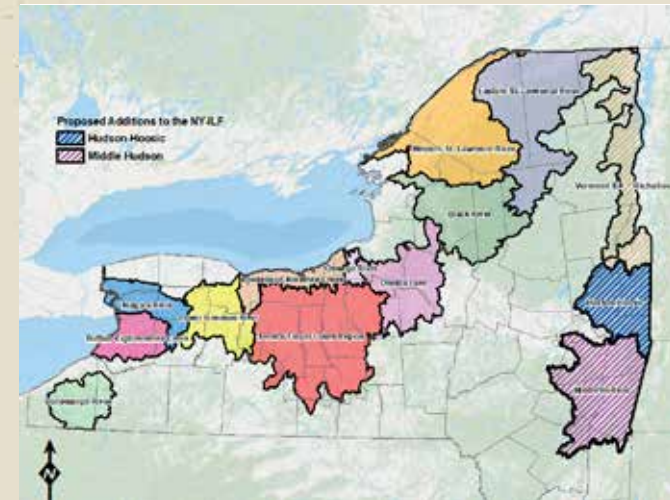
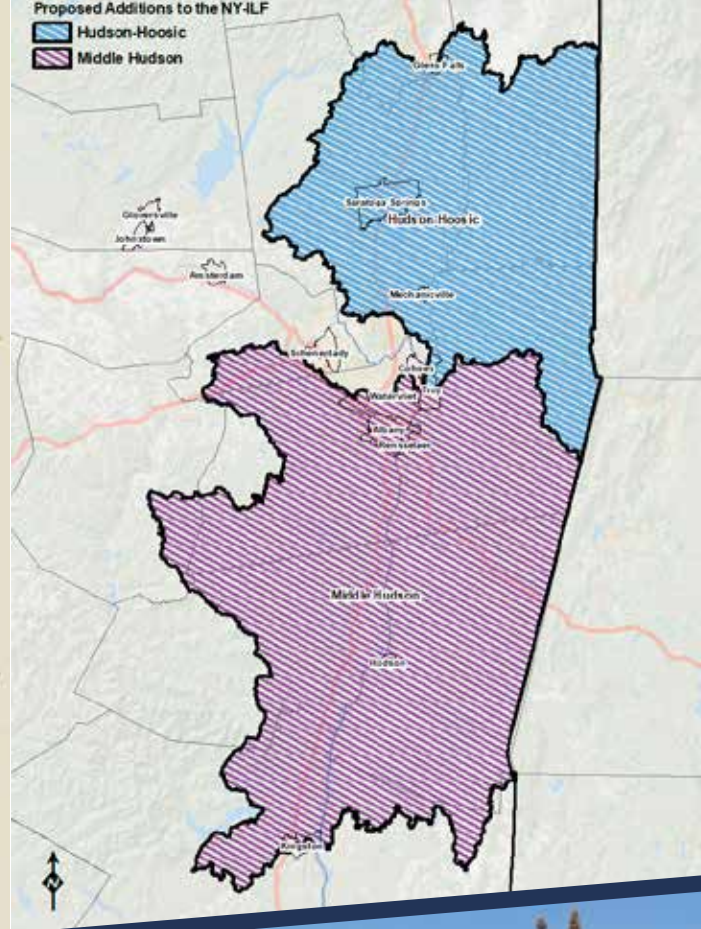
