ATCHAFALAYA DELTA WMA CREVASS PROJECT

In mid 2020, DU will enhance 1,450 acres of marsh at Atchafalaya Delta WMA by dredging channels to

improve the flow of freshwater and sediments from the Atchafalaya River. Dredging will be performed to clean out existing passes and crevasses that have silted in overtime and create a few new crevasses. This work will result in the nourishment and provide habitat for a wide variety of fish and wildlife, especially waterfowl. The public will also benefit from this work through improved boat access for hunting and fishing. Project partners include DU, Energy Transfer, Cargill, and Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries.

RUSSELL SAGE WMA - KENNEDY TRACT

Through a partnership with the Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries and the North American Wetlands Conservation Council, DU will make the Kennedy Tract one of the most

intensely managed public land waterfowl habitats in the state. The \$1.4-million project will improve infrastructure to allow more uniform and efficient water management across the tract. This project will enhance 1,250 acres of wildlife habitat. Ultimately, these improvements will increase plant diversity and provide greater foraging and loafing opportunities for migratory birds.

A combination of

crevasses (i.e., dredged channels) and marsh terraces will be used to improve the flow of sediment and freshwater from the Mississippi River to benefit wetlands. This work will also benefit shorebirds, wading birds, colonial seabirds, and secretive marsh birds and provide ideal foraging and loafing habitat for wintering waterfowl. In addition, the project will provide improved access for public hunting, fishing, and other wetland related recreation. Project partners include DU, Coastal Protection and Restoration Authority, National Wildlife Federation, Cajun Fishing Adventures, Chevron, Phillips 66, North American Wetlands Conservation Council and Gulf Coast Initiative sponsors.



POINTE AUX CHENES WMA - MOIST SOIL UNIT

DU recently completed the construction of an 85-acre moist soil unit on the south side of the Point Farm Unit of Pointe aux Chenes WMA. The project included levee repairs, installation of water control structures, dredging of ditches to enhance water movement, road improvements for access to the two sub-units of the project area, and purchase of an irrigation pump. These project features were needed for water level management and flooding/ draining of the unit with freshwater during the fall and winter. This moist soil unit was built in cooperation with Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries, Energy Transfer, Apache Corporation, Lamar Advertising Company, the Louisiana Wildlife and Fisheries Foundation, Shell, Phillips 66, Chevron, Axalta, the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation, and the Global Wildlife Center. The project was dedicated to Kell McInnis, retired executive director of the Louisiana Wildlife and Fisheries Foundation and a DU major sponsor.

FUNDRAISING UPDATE AND VOLUNTEER HIGHLIGHT


